1. ROLL CALL.

2. APPROVAL OF MINUTES.

2.1. Approval of Minutes. July 10, 2023, City Council Meeting.

Mayor Pro Tem Simpson moved to approve the minutes of the July 10, 2023, City Council meeting. Councilwoman Hardinger seconded the motion, and it was with the following vote: Ayes: Carroll, Lee, Jenson, Horton, McGull, Simpson, Hosmer, Hardinger, and McClure. Nays: None. Absent: None. Abstain: None.

3. FINALIZATION AND APPROVAL OF CONSENT AGENDAS.

CITIZENS WISHING TO SPEAK TO OR REMOVE ITEMS FROM THE CONSENT AGENDAS MUST DO SO AT THIS TIME.

The Consent Agenda was approved by the following vote: Ayes: Lee, Jenson, Horton, McGull, Simpson, Hosmer, Hardinger, Carroll, and McClure. Nays: None. Absent: None. Abstain: None.

4. CEREMONIAL MATTERS.

5. CITY MANAGER REPORT, POLICE CHIEF REPORT, AND RESPONSES TO QUESTIONS RAISED AT THE PREVIOUS CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

Jason Gage, City Manager, provided an update. He noted the Kansas City Chiefs Champions Tour would attend the Birthplace of Route 66 Festival on Friday, August 11 at the Springfield Expo Center. He added the club's Super Bowl trophy would be the main attraction at a rally from 4 to 6 p.m. at the Springfield Expo Center. In addition to the trophy, the event will include an appearance by the "Kingdom Cruiser" bus, appearances by Chiefs Cheerleaders, the Rumble drumline, the KC Wolf, and more. At 6 p.m., the bus and entourage would leave the facility and line up to join a portion of the Birthplace of Route 66 Parade. The best viewpoint will be on College Street from Main to Jefferson Avenue. He added the culmination of the day's events is scheduled for 7 p.m. at the festival's Motorcycle Village, where the cheerleaders and drumline will appear on the Aaron Sachs Stage. Machine Gun Symphony and Sixwire bands are scheduled to play at the end of the day.

Mr. Gage provided a ForwardSGF update. He noted Springfield is updating a series of City Codes that regulate the development of land and installation of public infrastructure. The City is creating Place Teams to facilitate meaningful, effective, and efficient engagement for discussion of these changes. The teams will be comprised of stakeholders and representative constituencies related to the specific context, and associated issues, in Springfield. Those interested can sign up at forwardsgf.com.

Mr. Gage noted Governor Mike Parson will be in Springfield on Thursday to deliver his State of the State Address, and will visit Fire Station 13 immediately following, around 1:30 p.m. He will be joined by Senator Lincoln Hough for the ceremonial signing of Senate Bill 24, which provides several provisions for 911 telecommunicators and first responders.

Paul Williams, Police Chief, provided a Police Chief's Report. He noted crimes against persons, property, and society were trending down through the end of May. Chief Williams further noted a 4% decline in crimes against persons, 20% decline in crimes against property, and a 1.4% increase in crimes against society, with an increase in prostitution arrests. He noted gun violence has had an increase in shots fired and injuries.

Chief Williams acknowledged crime prevention is more impactful than solving crime. There is a quarterly focus for crime prevention: quarter 1 focused on robbery and showed a 33% reduction, quarter 2 focused on sexual assaults and showed a 62% overall reduction, and quarter 3 focused on theft from vehicles is ongoing. He added the average theft from vehicles is 63 so far for 2023, and 133 illegal guns were seized so far in 2023. This has been trending down overall for the last five years.

Chief Williams provided an update on Data-Driven Approaches to Crime and Traffic Safety (DDACTS). He noted the department has increased visibility to drive crime down. This method was determined to be successful and expanded to a

city-wide effort. He added the average number of stops per officer is 62, an increase from 26 stops the previous year. Chief Williams reported a 6% decrease in traffic crashes over the last year.

Chief Williams noted municipal arrests remain consistent as outstanding warrants were worked through.

Chief Williams noted the Mental Health Co-Responder Program had 342 total incidents; 227 were resolved through the co-responder, and 95 were handled by the co-responder only.

Chief Williams provided an update on opioid incidents. He noted there were 156 overdoses, 9 fatalities, and 29 times Narcan was administered this year to date.

Chief Williams provided a recruiting update. Chief Williams noted there are currently 51 vacancies in the Police Department. He added that 18 full-time officers in training are already included in the total. Chief Williams noted there are two academy classes scheduled for next year. The goal is 20 attendees for every academy class. Chief Williams further noted there are currently 9 vacancies for Police Service Representatives.

Councilman McGull asked if marijuana-related traffic violations are being tracked. Chief Williams responded affirmatively and noted there was no data thus far.

Councilwoman Horton asked how feedback from the public matches what the report data shows. Chief Williams noted public perception may be different but is hopeful the data and public engagement will answer any questions the public may have.

Councilman Hosmer asked if the grant for flock cameras was accepted. Chief Williams noted the current cameras were funded as a pilot program through the current budget, and the grant is in process through the State.

Councilman Hosmer asked if there is data kept on repeat offenders regarding gun violence. Chief Williams responded this statistic is not kept. Councilman Hosmer expressed his belief the data could be tracked and possibly used to further protect the community. Chief Williams noted repeat offender information for criminals is tracked. Councilman Hosmer asked the status of the Police Department specific Human Resources position. Chief Williams responded he signed the paperwork for the position, and the department will have two positions, one focused on sworn personnel and the other on non-sworn personnel.

Mayor McClure noted he recently attended a session with the Director of the Department of Corrections to discuss rehabilitation efforts for offenders. He expressed his belief the approach was encouraging.

Councilman Jenson asked if there is a sense of where the illegal guns are coming from. Chief Williams noted illegal guns come from various sources, and guns are easily acquired to be used for illegal activity.

Councilman Jenson asked about efforts to enforce the noise ordinance. He noted this is a complaint he receives from citizens. Chief Williams responded that in regard to traffic noise, individuals will often take off at a high rate of speed and, for safety reasons, the officer will not pursue them. This adds to traffic noise. Chief Williams added that drones are beginning to be used as an operational tool. The department also works with the Highway Patrol to utilize their helicopter to find offenders.

Councilman Jenson asked for a brief overview of the camera registration program. Chief Williams responded registration for the program is through a form online. If the camera is registered, time could be saved as investigators can access the registrations as necessary. He added there are approximately 357 registrations.

Councilman McGull asked about the pros and cons of assigning squad cars and having assigned cars to be taken home by officers. Chief Williams responded two officers are assigned to each car at this time. He added take-home cars would be an item to be included in contract negotiations.

Councilwoman Carroll asked if time would be saved if the officers could each take home their own cars. Chief Williams responded that assigned cars help save time, and take-home cars are a separate issue.

Councilman Hosmer asked if officers could previously take the cars home. Chief Williams responded there is a funding stream in place for replacement of cars which helps build the fleet, which allows officers to be assigned to specific cars. Councilman Hosmer asked how many cars could be utilized for take-home cars. Chief Williams responded this is a benefit and would have to be negotiated in the contract.

(Staff and Planning and Zoning Commission both recommend approval.) (By: Campbell - Buena Vista LLC, VantEdge Auto T5; 4564 S. Campbell Avenue; Conditional Use Permit No. 474).

6.2. Council Bill 2023-171 (Horton)

A general ordinance amending the Springfield Land Development Code, Section 36-306, 'Official zoning map and rules for interpretation,' by rezoning approximately 2.3 acres of property generally located at 1630 North Jefferson Avenue and 1635 North Benton Avenue from R-SF, Single-family residential district, and CC, Center city district, with UC – Urban conservation district No. 3, to Planned Development No. 386; and adopting an updated Official Zoning Map. (Staff and Planning and Zoning Commission recommend approval.) (By: Titus Williams LLC & Historic Commercial Development LLC; 1630 N. Jefferson Avenue & 1635 N. Benton Avenue; Planned Development No. 386).

Councilman Lee acknowledged Titus Williams was a customer of his. He noted he would still vote.

Councilwoman Carroll acknowledged the developer is a shareholder and client at the bank she works for. She noted her intent to vote.

6.3. Council Bill 2023-172 (Horton)

A general ordinance amending the Springfield Land Development Code, Section 36-306, 'Official zoning map and rules for interpretation,' by rezoning approximately 25.92 acres of property generally located at 1353, 1409, and 1421 North West Bypass and 3538, 3550, and 3616 West Division Street from HC, Highway Commercial District, and GM, General Manufacturing District, to HM, Heavy Manufacturing District, with Conditional Overlay District No. 230; establishing Conditional Overlay District No. 230; and adopting an updated Official Zoning Map. (Staff and the Planning and Zoning Commission recommend approval.) (By: Demore Interprises Inc. & James Demore; 1353, 1409, 1421 North West Bypass & 3538, 3550, 3616 West Division Street; Z-14-2023 w/ COD No. 230).

6.4. Council Bill 2023-173 (Horton)

A general ordinance amending the Springfield Land Development Code, Section 36-306, 'Official zoning map and rules for interpretation,' by rezoning approximately 1.1 acres of property generally located at 3518, 3526, and 3532 West Waddill Street from GM, General Manufacturing District, to HC, Highway Commercial District; and adopting an updated Official Zoning Map. (Staff and Planning and Zoning Commission recommend approval.) (By: Wilson Trust; 3518, 3526, & 3532 West Waddill Street; Z-2-2023).

6.5. Council Bill 2023-174 (Horton)

A general ordinance amending the Springfield Land Development Code, Section 36-306, 'Official zoning map and rules for interpretation,' by rezoning approximately 1.1 acres of property generally located at 2035 West Kearney Street from HC, Highway Commercial District, to IC, Industrial Commercial District, with Conditional Overlay District No. 231; establishing Conditional Overlay District No. 231; and adopting an updated Official Zoning Map. (Staff and the Planning and Zoning Commission recommend approval.) (By: Craig and Lori Slater; 2035 W. Kearney Street; Z-15-2023 w/COD #231).

Council Bill 2023-174 (Horton) was approved by the following vote: Ayes: Hosmer, Hardinger, Carroll, Lee, Jenson, Horton, McGull, Simpson, and McClure. Nays: None. Absent: None. Abstain: None.

6.6. Council Bill 2023-175 (McGull)

A special ordinance granting Conditional Use Permit No. 475 for the purpose of permitting residential uses on the first-floor frontage within the GR – General retail district, generally located at 2000 North National Avenue. (Planning and Zoning Commission and staff recommend approval.) (By: 3 Best Friends, LLC; 2000 N. National Avenue; Conditional Use Permit No. 475).

Council Bill 2023-175 (McGull) was approved by the following vote: Ayes: Hardinger, Carroll, Lee, Jenson, Horton, McGull, Simpson, Hosmer, and McClure. Nays: None. Absent: None. Abstain: None.

6.7. Council Bill 2023-177 (Horton)

A special ordinance granting Conditional Use Permit No. 471 for the purpose of permitting a development project greater than 10,000 square feet of total building floor area and a building greater than three stories in height as a conditional use within the COM-1 – Commercial Street District, generally located at 411 West Commercial Street. (Planning and Zoning Commission recommends denial; staff recommends approval.) (By: Dan Johnson & Associates, LLC; 411 West Commercial Street; Conditional Use Permit No. 471).

Councilwoman Horton asked staff to discuss locations of additional parking. Martin Gugel, Assistant Director of Public Works, noted the additional spaces on Commercial Street would be restriped to gain parking spaces. Councilwoman Horton expressed her opinion the area needs to be more pedestrian-friendly and noted the importance of affordable housing.

Councilman McGull asked if there was public parking south of Commercial Street. Mr. Gugel responded affirmatively.

Councilman Jenson noted support for the comments of Councilwoman Horton. He further noted the importance of affordable housing and safe parking. He expressed his opinion the want of convenient parking should not outweigh the need for affordable housing. Councilman Jenson asked if a parking study was conducted for the City. Mr. Gugel responded the area was part of a parking study in 2015, and staff is looking at revising that parking study.

Councilman Lee acknowledged his support for the project. He commended staff for working with the neighborhood.

Mayor Pro Tem Simpson acknowledged his support for the project and expressed his opinion there is a need for affordable housing.

Council Bill 2023-177 (Horton) was approved by the following vote: Ayes: Carroll, Lee, Jenson, Horton, McGull, Simpson, Hosmer, Hardinger, and McClure. Nays: None. Absent: None. Abstain: None.

6.8. Council Bill 2023-178 (Jenson)

A special ordinance relinquishing certain sanitary sewer easements located at 3745 South Broadway Avenue for the purpose of accommodating construction of improvements at said location. (Planning and Zoning Commission and staff recommend approval.)

Councilman Lee asked why a condition was added that requires the project to be completed in one year. Brendan Griesemer, Interim Director of Planning and Development, responded this is standard language in the Code.

6.9. Council Bill 2023-179 (Hosmer)

A special ordinance amending the Fiscal Year 2022-2023 operating budget of the City of Springfield in the General Fund by increasing both revenue and expenses in the amount of \$143,679, for the purpose of adjusting for certain reimbursements and associated offsetting expenses, adjusting the salary budget for retirement payouts, and adjusting interdepartmental budgets.

Council Bill 2023-179 (Hosmer) was approved by the following vote: Ayes: Jenson, Horton, McGull, Simpson, Hosmer, Hardinger, Carroll, Lee, and McClure. Nays: None. Absent: None. Abstain: None.

6.10. Council Bill 2023-180 (Hardinger)

A special ordinance amending the Fiscal Year 2022-2023 operating budget of the City of Springfield by increasing both revenue and expenses in the amount of \$663,807, in various Special Revenue and Capital Project Funds, for the purpose of accounting for certain reimbursements and associated offsetting expense items.

Council Bill 2023-180 (Hardinger) was approved by the following vote: Ayes: Horton, McGull, Simpson, Hosmer, Hardinger, Carroll, Lee, Jenson, and McClure. Nays: None. Absent: None. Abstain: None.

6.11. Council Bill 2023-181 (Simpson)

A special ordinance accepting new right-of-way and an extension of South Florence Avenue, generally located at 1131 East Washita Street, connecting South Florence Avenue to East Washita Street. (Planning and Zoning Commission and staff recommend approval.)

7.1. Council Bill 2023-184 (McGull)

A resolution declaring the intent of the City of Springfield to annex approximately 10.6 acres of private property generally located at 4808 East Parallel Lane, referenced as Annexation A-4-2023, into the City. (Staff recommends approval.)

Daniel Neal, Senior City Planner, provided a brief overview of the proposed. Mr. Neal noted the proposed declares the intent to annex approximately 10.6 acres of property at 4808 East Parallel Lane. He added the property is located near the Buc-ee's that is being built. He noted it is in the City's service area. He further noted the annexation and rezoning will follow at a future City Council meeting.

Councilwoman Horton asked why the process includes a separate intent to annex and asked if the process could be streamlined. Mr. Gage responded in general, the process has some flexibility and, in some cases, could be streamlined. Mr. Gage noted the process would be reviewed.

A resolution declaring the intent of the City of Springfield to annex approximately 28 acres of private property generally located at 5500 East Farm Road 104, referenced as Annexation A-5-2023, into the City. (Staff recommends approval.)

Daniel Neal, Senior City Planner, provided a brief overview of the proposed. Mr. Neal noted the proposed declares the intent to annex approximately 28 acres of property at 5500 East Farm Road 104. He added the property is located near the new Buc-ee's. He further noted the annexation and rezoning will follow at a future City Council meeting.

7.3. Council Bill 2023-186 (Horton)

A resolution approving the Master Plan for the Fairgrounds submitted by the Greene County Agricultural and Mechanical Society of Springfield, Missouri.

Rhonda Lewsader, City Attorney, provided a brief overview of the proposed. Ms. Lewsader noted the City worked with the Fair Board to revise the Fairgrounds lease. She added Kent Hyde, a representative of the Fair Board, would present the Master Plan for the Fairgrounds which was submitted by the Greene County Agricultural and Mechanical Society of Springfield, Missouri.

Kent Hyde noted the lease requires an updated Master Plan. He added there is a new arena being constructed, which will be completed in approximately September. Mr. Hyde noted the Master Plan also included the intention of improving the structures and using the property as a national venue. He added the arena will have 24-hour security during the Fair. He noted ARPA funds were received for the arena. He added the intention is to refence the property, build an additional barn, create 400 additional camping spots, and use the approximately 6,700-seat arena for attractions such as arena football.

Mayor McClure noted he toured the facility and expressed his opinion that it was impressive and an asset to the community.

Councilwoman Carroll expressed her belief this adds to the quality of life in Springfield. She asked about the most current fundraiser. Mr. Hyde responded the total raised was approximately \$430,000.

13.1. Council Bill 2023-188 (Hosmer)

A special ordinance amending the General Fund budget for the City Clerk for the City of Springfield, Missouri, for Fiscal Year 2023-2024, by appropriating a portion of the accumulated carryover funds and increasing expenses in the amount of \$250,000 for special election costs related to whether to impose an additional sales tax on the retail sales of adult use marijuana.

David Holtmann, Director of Finance, provided a brief overview of the proposed. Mr. Holtmann noted the proposed would amend the General Fund Budget for the City Clerk to cover the cost of the August special election regarding imposing an additional retail sales tax on adult use marijuana.

Councilman Hosmer asked about the cost of the election. Mr. Holtmann responded the amount is for the bulk of the cost of the election. He added the amount is the estimate given by Greene County.

An opportunity was given for citizens to express their views. With no appearances, the public hearing was declared closed.

13.2. Council Bill 2023-189 (Carroll)

A special ordinance approving the plans and specifications for the Sanitary Sewer Overflow Control Program, Group 5, Batch 4, Public Sewer Rehabilitation – Sewer Main Cleaning, CCTV, and Cured-in-Place Pipe Project; accepting the bid of Insituform Technologies USA, LLC, in the amount of \$5,658,166.12 for the Project; authorizing the City Manager, or his designee, to enter into an agreement for said Project; and approving a budget adjustment for the amount needed, plus a 10% contingency, to fund the Project, by amending the Fiscal Year 2023-2024 budget of the Department of Environmental Services Clean Water Enterprise Fund by appropriating reserves of said fund in the necessary amount of \$3,300,000.00.

Erick Roberts, Assistant Director of Environmental Services, provided a brief overview of the proposed. Mr. Roberts noted the proposed would approve the plans and specifications for the Sanitary Sewer Overflow Control Program, Group 5, Batch 4, Public Sewer Rehabilitation – Sewer Main Cleaning, CCTV, and Cured-in-Place Pipe Project in the amount of \$5,658,166.12. He added the bid was the low bid and continues the City's sewer rehabilitation project.

An opportunity was given for citizens to express their views. With no appearances, the public hearing was declared closed.

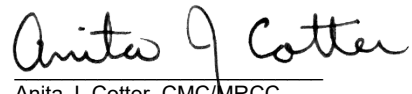
